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Failed Adoption TO Adoption... An Adoptive Mom's Story

To begin, this is our story of failed adoption. Our adoption journey started about 4 years ago. It was about a year after we completed all our training and paperwork that we were notified we'd been MATCHED!!! The JOY of that moment was one we'll never forget. Baby girl was due in 1 MONTH! We met with our expectant mother and immediately fell in love. We were incredibly humbled that she had chosen us and we enjoyed every moment with her and her wonderful family. To this day, we feel blessed to have known them.

Baby girl came a few days early by emergency Csection so we weren't able to be there when she was born. I remember walking into the room and I hugged the new mother. She looked down at her beautiful little girl and said, "Isn't she precious?" I knew in that moment this little girl had her mama's heart. As beautiful as that was, my heart was gripped with doubt that we'd be the ones taking her home.

The plan had been for us to have baby girl in our room that night but her mother kept her in her room that night instead. Doubt that she'd be ours set in even deeper. The next morning while we visited in her room, it was pretty quiet, as though someone wanted to tell us something but couldn't. Our social worker sent us a text to meet her in the lobby. Together, we decided that we should go home and give her space to decide. Deep down we knew we'd never get a call back and we didn't. The feeling of LOSS is deep. It was hard coming back to an empty house, to an empty room, to our empty arms. Those first 3 days were numbing. We were emotionally exhausted. We remember saying, "What now?" We had so many dreams for our lives with this little girl and now they were gone.

How did we pick up the pieces and start again? FIRST, we grieved and let others grieve with us. SECOND, we thanked God for an incredible opportunity to LOVE this family and prayed for their future and the life of that sweet baby girl. We are not going to lie and say we didn't want to feel a bit sour towards them. It's really easy to let bitterness creep in if you let it. No one can blame her for the decision she made and we certainly didn't. It was just the disappointment talking, trying to find someone to blame for this heartache. THIRD, we picked up where we'd left off and eventually the hum and flow of our lives went back to normal. We'd been marked in a beautiful, yet painful, way that God has used time and time again to minister to others and for THAT we are truly grateful. We don't downplay our grief or the loss we and others have endured, but we also refuse to wallow in it. We know we have SO much to be grateful for and there are so many that wish they had even a quarter of what we do, so it is important to keep some perspective as well. NOW, here we are 2 years later, parents to a beautiful little boy.

This is our story of ADOPTION. We got the call on June 1st 2017 that we'd been MATCHED once again! We were elated of course, but also very cautious for the sake of our own hearts. We went into this with NO expectations. We were in it purely to LOVE the one we'd been matched with and IF it resulted in a child in the end, THEN we would let the JOY of this new life wash over us. Would there have still been disappointment and heartache? Absolutely, BUT we were better prepared this time.

She was due in 3 months and from the moment we met her and her family we couldn't help but fall in love once again. The baby was born the evening of September 14th and we were discharged 2 days later with him in our arms. The final papers weren't to be signed for another 2 days so it was still a risk even though we hadn't seen birth mom waver in any way. We knew she could still change her mind even after all the time we'd spent with him. We were in LOVE with this little soul, no matter how much we tried not to get attached.

The morning of the entrustment came and we all met at the CSSM office. Our hearts were pounding hoping that there hadn't been a change of heart. At the same time, we didn't want to be the cause of her pain. She signed the papers as tears rolled down her face. Telling each other what we meant to one another was impossible. Everyone was sobbing. The LOVE we had and continue to have for this young woman is so deep. As she handed us her son, I took her in my arms and she wept uncontrollably. My heart broke realizing the weight of the decision she'd just made. It was the most beautiful act of selfless love we'd ever witnessed, and it marked us for life.

We were overjoyed on the way home, seeing a little human finally filling that car seat we'd had for 4 years. At the same time, I grieved for the first week we had him home. I felt such a sense of responsibility for the birth mom's pain. We look back over these past 4 years of great loss and great love and are just in AWE at what God has done through it all. SO many have been touched because of this journey and WE have been forever changed. We can allow our heartbreaks to BREAK us OR we can find the diamond in the rough and press on knowing the BEST IS YET TO COME!

Wendy's Wonderful Kids

2017 has been a busy year for Katie Lamach, our Wendy's Wonderful Kids Recruiter. She traveled all over the state establishing and maintaining relationships with children in the foster care system who are waiting to be adopted. She had children scattered from Trout Creek to Billings. Some wonderful news is that 1 of the children on her caseload was adopted on November 13th! Two other children are waiting for court dates to finalize their adoptions. Katie had many children featured on the CBS news segment, A Waiting Child. She also has children featured in the Heart Gallery at the Missoula Southgate Mall with a picture and brief description. Katie has helped many of the children have new experiences, such as pottery and fly fishing. A 10 year old girl that she works with loves it when Katie brings her dog to town. A frequent quote from this girl is, "Katie, I think your dog misses me because she really likes me. Maybe you should bring her next time."

The services Wendy's Wonderful Kids Recruiters provide are extremely important for children in foster care. More than 130,000 children in the foster care system across the nation are waiting to be adopted. In Montana, 661 children are permanent wards of the State and waiting to find adoptive families. Of those children, 191 reside in counties covered by the Wendy's Wonderful Kids Recruiter at Catholic Social Services of Montana. We believe every child is adoptable and every child deserves a safe, loving and permanent family. Across the US, it is estimated that 20,532 children will age out of the foster care system without a family or home to call their own. Wendy's Wonderful Kids is trying to change those numbers. More than 6,500 children have been adopted through the Wendy's Wonderful Kids Program.
